Baker Wetlands

One of the most diverse habitats in Kansas, the Baker Wetlands encompasses 927 acres of rich, natural flora and fauna. Students, faculty, and nature lovers have identified 376 vertebrate species, and 487 plant species at the Wetlands. Restored prairie and grasslands, riparian forest areas, ponds, and wetlands are all part of the area.

Spearheaded by Roger and Jon Boyd, the Baker Wetlands are changing and improving. More land is being restored, the wetlands are expanding, new trails have been added, and the Baker Wetlands Discovery Center has opened.

The 10,000 square foot Discovery Center has exhibits on the importance of the wetlands and how they were restored. There are also family friendly stations where kids can check out pelts and other animal artifacts. In addition to the exhibits, the Discovery Center has spotting scopes, a research laboratory, observatory tower and classroom space. Built to be eco-friendly, 75% of the electric needs at the site are produced by a 10 KWH solar array.

With a simple set of rules, the wetlands and Discovery Center are a great place to visit.

Discovery Center hours – winter: 9 a.m. – noon, and 1-3 p.m. Monday – Saturday; 1-3 p.m. Sunday.

Discovery Center hours – summer: 9 a.m. – 4 p.m. Monday – Saturday; 1-4 p.m. Sunday.

Wetland hours - dawn to dusk.

Dogs must be leashed.

Take only pictures, leave only footprints.

Just off the South Lawrence Trafficway, located at 1365 N 1250 Rd. in Lawrence, the wetlands are easy to find and easy to get to.

Two awards will be presented at the Douglas County Conservation District's Annual Meeting on Thursday, February 9th.

The Kansas Bankers Association Soil Conservation Recognition Award will be presented to Glenn Rockers. Mr. Rockers has been involved in constructing terraces and other conservation projects with the District for nearly 56 years. In addition to his contractor work, Mr. Rockers has installed multiple conservation practices on his own farm.

The District's Wildlife Conservation award will be presented to the Baker Wetlands and Discovery Center, in recognition of efforts to restore and establish wetlands, native prairie, and riparian forest in the Wakarusa River Valley. Normally the District gives awards to an individual, but we believe the Baker Wetlands provide such a unique environmental resource for the county that this year we would give an award to the land, rather than an individual.

The optimum time to plant native grasses is December 1st-May 15th, so as you plan your spring projects, remember the District has a seed drill available for rental. The LandPride 606 NT seed drill has a 6-foot head and can easily be towed behind a pickup truck for travel to and from sites. With three seed boxes, warm season grasses, cool season grasses, and forbs can all be seeded. The rental rate is \$100 check-out fee, plus \$10 per acre.
